It has become widely acknowledged that the two Congo Wars between 1996-2003 have cost the lives of 5.4 million people, mostly from disease and starvation, while millions have been displaced by the violence. In the aftermath, some 30 different militia continue to terrorize the local population with horrendous killings and brutal sexual violence. Several of these armed groups reportedly have been able to sustain themselves through illegal mining activities.

Books for Learning More about White Privilege and Undoing Racism Pastor Jane spoke about 5 books she is placing the church library for those who are interested in learning more about our own white privilege and the work of undoing racism.

- 1. White Flour by David LaMotte, Illustrated by Jenn Hales. A children's book based on a true story about a creative, nonviolent, even humorous response by the "Coup Clutz Clowns" in a town where the KluKluxKlan was on a march. It bears witness to a profound truth: that humor and love are vital tools for break down barriers and overcoming hate.
- 2. **Between the World and Me** by Ta-Nehisi Coates. In a profound work that pivots from the biggest questions about American history and ideals to the most intimate concerns of a father for his son, Ta-Nehisi Coates offers a powerful new framework for understanding our nation's history and current crisis. Americans have built an empire on the idea of "race," a

Alternative Gifts Fair Save the Dates! November 8 and 15: our Twelfth Annual Alternative Gifts Fair falsehood that damages us all but falls most heavily on the bodies of black women and men—bodies exploited through slavery and segregation, and, today, threatened, locked up, and murdered out of all proportion. What is it like to inhabit a black body and find a way to live within it? And how can we all honestly reckon with this fraught history and free ourselves from its burden? Between the World and Me is Ta-Nehisi Coates's attempt to answer these questions in a letter to his adolescent son. Coates shares with his son—and readers—the story of his awakening to the truth about his place in the world through a series of revelatory experiences, from Howard University to Civil War battlefields, from the South Side of Chicago to Paris, from his childhood home to the living rooms of mothers whose children's lives were taken as American plunder. Beautifully woven from personal narrative, reimagined history, and fresh, emotionally charged reportage, Between the World and Meclearly illuminates the past, bracingly confronts our present, and offers a transcendent vision for a way forward.

- 3. The Cross and the Lynching Tree by James Cone. The cross and the lynching tree are the two most emotionally charged symbols in the history of the African American community. In this powerful work, theologian James H. Cone explores these symbols and their interconnection in the history and souls of black folk. Drew Hart, speaker at AMBS 2015 Pastors Week, recommends as necessary reading for "the white church".
- 4. **Just Mercy** by Bryan Stevenson. A powerful true story about the potential for mercy to redeem us, and a clarion call to fix our broken system of justice. Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinksmanship—and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever. Just Mercy is at once an unforgettable account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has defended, and an inspiring argument for compassion in the pursuit of true justice.
- 5. The New Jim Crow by Michelle Alexander. Once in a great while a book comes along that changes the way we see the world and helps to fuel a nationwide social movement. The New Jim Crow is such a book. Praised as "brave and bold," this book directly challenges the notion that the election of Barack Obama signals a new era of colorblindness. With dazzling candor, legal scholar Michelle Alexander argues that "we have not ended racial caste in America; we have merely redesigned it." By targeting black men through the War on Drugs and decimating communities of color, the U.S. criminal justice system functions as a contemporary system of racial control—relegating millions to a permanent second-class status—even as it formally adheres to the principle of colorblindness. In the words of Benjamin Todd Jealous, president and CEO of the NAACP, this book is a "call to action."

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
