



## Fall Adult Sunday School: The Gospel of John

Starting Sunday, September

11

Christian Education classes exploring the book of John will begin Sunday, September 11. Each lesson will generally consist of one chapter (occasionally two) per Sunday over a period of 19 Sundays. The classes below will approach John with a variety of methods to mine the insights, wisdom and challenges of the life of Jesus through the pen of John. Please join us!

### Discussion and Input

Tim Schrag, facilitator

Each session will begin with a 30 minute "encounter with the text". There will be discussion and sharing within smaller groups, focused on questions from the book JOHN by N.T. Wright. Participants should expect to read the assigned chapter from the gospel prior to class. (It is not necessary to read the N.T. Wright book.) Tim will gather up insights from the small groups and offer some additional comments to conclude the last 15 minutes.

### Peeling Away the Layers

The book of John is full of Jesus' simple words that have deep meaning. This class will focus on connecting those perplexing words of Jesus from his world to ours. The class will use a variety of methods—artwork, speaking the Scripture, acting, mini-lecture, and discussion—to help bring insights and inspiration to light.

### Lectio Divina and Contemplative Response

Letting Jesus speak to our hearts through the spiritual practice of Lectio Divina will be our approach to studying the book of John. Lectio Divina is meditatively reading through the passage, prayerfully considering Jesus' words, and being open to what God wants to say to us. In addition to Lectio each week, other approaches to hearing God in the scripture, such as call and

response, poetry, journaling, art or music may also be used to enhance our understanding we listen for God's still small voice speaking into our lives.

Bible Study Darrel Miller, leader

This class will be a combination of lecture and discussion. The Believers Church commentary on John by Willard Swartley and Michael Card's book, JOHN: The Gospel of Wisdom, from his Biblical Imagination series, will be resources used for studying the passage. If you like to have a book to read to prepare for the lesson, Card's book is available on Amazon for \$15.64.

### **High School Study**

This class will use a variety of different resources to help guide discussions based on the passages from the book of John. This class is open to all high schoolers and will follow the same Scripture selections as the adult classes.



### **Today's Story**

Once upon a time two brothers who lived on adjoining farms fell into conflict. It was the first serious rift in 40 years of farming side by side, sharing machinery, and trading labor and goods as needed without a hitch. Then the long collaboration fell apart. It began with a small misunderstanding and it grew into a major difference, and finally it exploded into an exchange of bitter words followed by weeks of silence.

One morning there was a knock on the older brother's door.

He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's toolbox. "I'm looking for few days work" he said. "Perhaps you would have a few small jobs here and there. Could I help you?"

"Yes," said the older brother. "I do have a job for you. Look across the creek at that farm. That's my neighbor, in fact, it's my younger brother. Last week there was a meadow between us and he took his bulldozer to the river levee and now there is a creek between us. Well, he may have done this to spite me, but I'll go him one better. See that pile of lumber curing by the barn? I want you to build me a fence, an 8-foot fence so I won't need to see his place anymore. Cool him down, anyhow.

The carpenter said, "I think I understand the situation. Show me the nails and the post-hole digger and I'll be able to do a job that pleases you."

The older brother had to go to town for supplies, so he helped the carpenter get the materials ready and then he was off for the day.

The carpenter worked hard all that day measuring, sawing, nailing. About sunset when the farmer returned, the carpenter had just finished his job.

The farmer's eyes opened wide, his jaw dropped. There was no fence there at all. It was a bridge - a bridge stretching from one side of the creek to the other! A fine piece of work handrails and all; and the neighbor, his younger brother, was coming across, his hand outstretched.

"You are quite a fellow to build this bridge after all I've said and done." The two brothers stood at each end of the bridge, and then they met in the middle, hugging. They turned to see the carpenter hoist his toolbox on his shoulder. "No, wait! Stay a few days. I've a lot of other projects for you," said the older brother.

"I'd love to stay on," the carpenter said, "but, I have many more bridges to build."
